



July Update from the Parish Council

Greetings from the Parish Council! We hope you and your family members are doing well and staying healthy. Glory to God!

We want to express our sincerest gratitude to everyone who has submitted a stewardship pledge this year and for continuing to submit your payments. The bills continue to come in, and with our significantly reduced ability to conduct fund raising events, 2020 will strain St. George financially. Thank you for your most generous and continued support.

Over the last few months, the Parish Council has been working very closely with Father Neofitos and the Church staff to keep our facilities clean and to manage the reopening for services. Obviously this has been very challenging as we must follow close regulations laid out by New York State and the Archdiocese. We want to thank everyone for your patience, cooperation, and willingness to abide by the new protocols we've put in place for when you are in the Church and Hellenic Center. Everything is done with your safety in mind.

We also want to thank those of you who have been ushering. Your work is very important, and we are blessed to receive your donation of time and love for St. George and the safety of its parishioners. We are in need of new ushers to join the team as well. Church Electrical Project

The electrical infrastructure of the Church is old and in dire need of upgrading ... not only for safety but also improved efficiency and cost savings. The Parish Council has identified this project as our top priority at this time. Based on the electrical audit and upgrades done on the Hellenic Center last year, we anticipate the cost to do the same work in the Church to be around \$20,000 or more. We will be announcing soon the details of a new capital campaign to raise funds for the much needed electrical upgrades in the Church. Stay tuned!

Facility Updates

In June, two major projects were successfully completed. First, the new Hellenic Center roof installation was finished at long last. And second, all the pot holes in the parking lot and driveway were repaired, and the entire lot was resealed and the lines were repainted. It looks great. In the weeks ahead, the shed will be repaired and repainted, along with other exterior painting and improvements to the Hellenic Center and surrounding grounds. In the near future we will look at replacing the ceiling tiles inside the Center.

2020 Festival and Fall Fundraising Activities

The Parish Council and the Festival Planning team together decided that we <u>are not</u> able to hold our annual Festival this year. Obviously we rely heavily on the profits generated by this wonderful event and replacing that income will be challenging. We hope to hold a number of smaller fundraising events this fall starting on the usual Festival weekend in September (11-12).

On Sunday, July 19th after Church, we are holding a very important meeting in the Hellenic Center to finalize and implement plans for these fall events. We will practice social distancing and mask wearing at this meeting. <u>If you have been a leader of any aspect of the past Festivals, we need you at this meeting as decisions will be made</u>. All parishioners are encouraged to attend to bring your ideas, time and talents to help out. The immediate future of St. George is depending on the work we do now.

ENCYCLICAL OF HIS EMINENCE ARCHBISHOP ELPIDOPHOROS OF AMERICA

The Fourth of July, 2020

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As your Archbishop of America, it is truly a joy to celebrate with you the Fourth of July, the day when all Americans and indeed the whole world commemorate our Independence Day. Even though this Declaration was made on July 4, 1776 in Philadelphia, the fight for liberty commenced much earlier, on April 19, 1775, in Lexington and Concord, where at the Old North Bridge, as the poet Ralph Waldo Emerson later sang:

By the rude bridge that arched the flood, Their flag to April's breeze unfurled, Here once the embattled farmers stood And fired the shot heard round the world.

Our legacy of that victory, and of the sacrifice of every generation of Americans who, in President Abraham Lincoln's immortal words at Gettysburg, "gave the last full measure of devotion," is not to take bridges, but to build bridges. We have to be honest about the divisions in our Nation and how polarized our society feels, especially in the continuing aftermath of the pandemic and the social unrest over basic inequities in our land. Building bridges of dialogue, of mutual respect, of seeking shared understanding – these are the best of America and honor the heroes who have kept America "the land of the free and home of the brave." The strength of America is our diversity, our plurality, for "E Pluribus Unum" – out of many, we are one!

My beloved Christians, as we celebrate the greatness of our Nation on the Fourth of July, let us remember how we attained the exceptional freedoms we all enjoy, and work to ensure these freedoms are true for every American. Let us engage one another with vigor and commitment, "speaking the truth in love" (Ephesians 4:15) on every vital issue, even as we hold in dear remembrance those who made the ultimate sacrifice for God and country.

At that time, when Jesus came to the other side, to the country of the Gergesenes, two demoniacs met him, coming out of the tombs, so fierce that no one would pass that way. And behold, they cried out, "What have you to do with us, O Son of God? Have you come here to torment us before the time?" Now a herd of many swine was feeding at some distance from them. And the demons begged him, "If you cast us out, send us away into the herd of swine." And he said to them, "Go." So they came out and went into the swine; and behold, the whole herd rushed down the steep bank into the sea, and perished in the waters. The herdsmen fled, and going into the city they told everything, and what had happened to the demoniacs. And behold, all the city came out to meet Jesus; and when they saw him, they begged him to leave their neighborhood. And getting into a boat he crossed over and came to his own city.

St. Paisios of Mount Athos - orthodoxwiki.org (icon front cover)

Our venerable and God-bearing Father Paisios of Mount Athos or Paisios the New, of the Holy Mountain (July 25, 1924 – July 12, 1994), also known as Elder Paisios (Greek: Γέροντας Παΐσιος ο Αγιορείτης), was a monastic of Mount Athos. An ascetic, he was known by his visitors for his gentle manner and acceptance of those who came to receive his advice, counsel, and blessing. His words of counsel continue to be published. [1] Elder Paisios was canonized on January 13, 2015, by the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople.[1][2] The Church commemorates St. Paisios on July 12.

Arsenios Eznepidis was born on July 25, 1924, to pious parents in the town of Farasa, Cappadocia of Asia Minor, shortly before the population exchange between Greece and Turkey following the Greco-Turkish War of 1919-1922. Arsenios' name was given to him by St. Arsenios the Cappadocian, who baptized him, named the child for himself and foretold Arsenios' monastic future. Very shortly after his baptism the young Arsenios and his family were forced to leave Asia Minor in accordance the peace Treaty of Lausanne. St. Arsenios guided his flock along a 400-mile trek to Greece. The Eznepidis family finally settled in the town of Konitsa in Epirus in northwestern Greece. As he had prophesied, St. Arsenios reposed forty days after the group settled in Greece, leaving, as his spiritual heir, the infant Arsenios. Arsenios grew up in Konitsa and learned carpentry after completing intermediate public school.

During the civil war in Greece following World War II, Arsenios served as a radio operator. While concerned about his compatriots who had family, he didn't worry for himself because he was single and had no children. He was noted for his bravery, self-sacrifice and moral righteousness. After the civil war ended, he wanted to enter a monastic life, but had to consider his sisters, who were as yet unmarried. By 1950, he had provided for his sisters' future and was free to begin his monastic vocation

He arrived on Mount Athos in 1950, first to Fr. Kyril, the future abbot of Koutloumousiou Monastery, and then to Esphigmenou Monastery. In 1954, Arsenios, having been a novice for four years, was tonsured a monk and was given the name Averkios. He was a conscientious monk, finding ways to both complete his obediences (which required contact with others) and to preserve his silence, so as to progress in the art of prayer. He was always selfless in helping his brethren. He was unwilling to rest while others worked (though he may have already completed his own obediences) as he loved his brothers greatly and without distinction. In addition to his ascetic struggles and the common life in the monastery, he was spiritually enriched through the reading of soul-profiting books. In particular, he read the lives of the Saints, the Gerontikon, and especially the Ascetical Homilies of St. Isaac the Syrian.[2]s.

Soon after his tonsure, monk Averkios left Esphigmenou and joined the then idiorhythmic brotherhood of Philotheou Monastery, where his uncle was a monk. He placed himself under obedience to the Elder Symeon, who gave him the Small Schema in 1956, with the new name Paisios. Fr. Paisios dwelt deeply on the thought that his own spiritual failures and lack of love were the cause of his neighbor's shortcomings, as well as of the world's ills. He harshly accused himself and pushed



himself to greater self-denial and more fervent prayer for his soul and for the whole world. He also cultivated the habit of seeking the "good reason" for a potentially scandalous event and for people's actions. In this way he preserved himself from judging others. For example, pilgrims to Mt. Athos who had been scandalized by the strange behavior and stories told by a certain monk would when they met Elder Paisios, asked him what was wrong with the monk. He warned them not to judge others, and that this monk was actually virtuous and was simply pretending to be a fool when visitors would come, so as to preserve his silence.

In 1958, Elder Paisios was asked to spend some time in and around his home village so as to support the faithful against the proselytism of Protestant groups. He greatly encouraged the faithful there, helping many people. Later, in 1962, he visited Sinai where he stayed for two years. During this time he became beloved of the Bedouins who benefited both spiritually as well as materially from his presence. The Elder used the money he received from the sale of his carved wooden handicraft to buy them food.

In 1964, on his return to Mt. Athos, Elder Paisios took up residence at the Skete of Iviron before moving to Katounakia at the southernmost tip of Mt. Athos for a short stay in the desert there. The Elder's failing health may have been part of the reason for his departure from the desert. In 1966, a part of his lungs was removed during an operation. It was during this time of hospitalization that his long friendship began with the young sisterhood of St. John the Theologian in Souroti, just outside of Thessaloniki. During his operation he greatly needed blood and it was then that a group of novices from the monastery donated blood to save him. Elder Paisios was most grateful, and after his recovery, he did whatever he could, materially and spiritually, to help them build their monastery.

In 1968, he resided at the Monastery of Stavronikita helping with its spiritual as well as material renovation. While there he had the blessing of being in contact with the ascetic Elder Tikhon who lived in the Hermitage of the Holy Cross, near Stavronikita. Elder Paisios stayed by his side until his repose, serving him selflessly as his disciple. It was during this period that Elder Tikhon clothed Fr. Paisios in the Great Schema. According to the wishes of the Elder, Fr. Paisios remained in Elder Tikhon's hermitage after his repose. Fr. Paisios stayed there until 1979, when he moved to his final home on the Holy Mountain, the hermitage Panagouda, which belongs to the Monastery of Koutloumousiou. [3]

It was at Panagouda that Elder Paisios' fame as a God bearing elder grew, drawing to him the sick and suffering people of God. He received them all day long, dedicating the night to God in prayer, vigil, and spiritual struggle. His regime of prayer and asceticism left him with only two or three hours each night for rest. The self-abandon with which he served God and his fellow man, his strictness with himself, the austerity of his regime, and his sensitive nature made him increasingly prone to sickness. In addition to respiratory problems, in his later days he suffered from a serious hernia that made life very painful. When he was forced to leave the Holy Mountain for various reasons (often due to his illnesses) he would receive pilgrims for hours on end at the women's monastery at Souroti. The physical effort which this entailed in his weakened state caused him such pain that he would turn pale. He bore his suffering with much grace, confident that, as God knows what is best for us, it could not be otherwise. He would say that God is greatly touched when someone who is in great suffering does not complain, but rather uses his energy to pray for others.

In addition to his other illnesses he suffered from hemorrhaging which left him very weak. In his final weeks before leaving the Holy Mountain, he would often fall unconscious. On October 5, 1993, the Elder left his beloved Holy Mountain for the last time. Though he had planned on being off the mountain for just a few days, while in Thessaloniki he was diagnosed with cancer that needed immediate treatment. After the operation he spent some time recovering in the hospital and was then transferred to the monastery at Souroti. Despite his critical state he received people, listening to their sorrows and counseling them.

After his operation, Elder Paisios had his heart set on returning to Mt. Athos. His attempts to do so, however, were hindered by his failing health. His last days were full of suffering, but also of the joy of the martyrs. On July 11, 1994, he received Holy Communion for the last time. The next day, Elder Paisios gave his soul into God's keeping. He was buried, according to his wishes, at the Monastery of St. John the Theologian in Souroti. Elder Paisios, perhaps more than any other contemporary elder, captured the minds and hearts of the Greek people. Many books of his counsels have been published, and the monastery at Souroti has undertaken a great work, organizing the Elder's writings and counsels into impressive volumes befitting his memory. Thousands of pilgrims visit his tomb each year.

Elder Paisios was glorified on January 13, 2015, by the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople. He is commemorated each year on July 12.

Philoptochos News

from Olga Delorey

It has been a year unlike any other. A year ago, we had no priest and no church services. Remarkably, our church doors were open every single Sunday thanks to the determination and dedication of Gladys Paravalos and those who assisted her with the Orthros and Fellowship Coffee

Hours. Not once were our doors closed. We entered the church to pray, light our candles, and felt the "peace in the silence". We prayed to God to watch over and protect our beloved church and its people. In October, our prayers were answered when we received word that a new priest would be sent to us. On November 9th, we witnessed the inspirational Holy Ordination of Father Neofitos Sarigiannis and welcomed him and Presvytera Catherine into our St. George family. Our patience and prayers were, and continue to be, rewarded many times over. The church was full once again, services were abundant, activities in the Hellenic Center were thriving, visitors were welcomed from near and far ... and then it all stopped. Never in my life did I imagine we would be struck with a pandemic such as we have now. Suddenly, we had to learn how to be "together apart" and "socially distant". We tried to make sense of it all. Church services were watched from afar on an electronic device. Despite our inability to be physically present, we offered thanks to God for this new "virtual" form of worship. We were blessed to have Father and Presvytera continue with the entire calendar of services throughout Lent, Holy Week and beyond until now when at last we can attend church and receive Holy Communion.

Since last September, our Philoptochos has continued to fulfill its charitable mission despite the challenges we now face. In recent months, however, one of our most important ministries – **Soup Kitchen** – has ceased for the foreseeable future. Organizations such as the Salvation Army and City Mission of Schenectady have had to alter how they provide services and at this time they are not allowing volunteer groups into their facilities. I don't know when, or even if, this ministry will resume; and it may take a very different form. The overriding priority is to keep everyone safe. Our heartfelt gratitude to everyone who supported this ministry over the years - both financially and by working on the Soup Kitchen Team preparing and serving the monthly meals. Our participation in Soup Kitchen began more than 30 years ago. As time went on and the need became greater, we served an average of 150 people each month. Each person received a complete hot dinner – Greek style! As people departed we heard many times over "thank you and God bless you". For the past 15 years, the success of this ministry would not have been possible without the leadership of our beloved **Kathy and Charlie Koines**. Sadly, we lost our dear sister on September 1, 2019 after a courageous battle with cancer. Kathy was a faithful and dedicated member of our Philoptochos and St. George Church. May her memory be eternal. Charlie will soon relocate to Cape Cod where he will be near the family of his early years. Charlie, you will always be part of "our" family, and we wish you and your family good health, peace and comfort. We are forever indebted to all you did in the name of Philoptochos.

On September 21, 2019 the three Philoptochos Chapters from St. George, St. Sophia and St. Basil organized and sponsored "TRAPPED: In Our Own Backyard: A Symposium on Human Trafficking & A Story of Survival". There were six panelists – professionals representing social service and law enforcement agencies – all who work in the field of human trafficking. The final presenter was a brave young woman – herself a survivor who endured unimaginable abuse which began when she was a child. Elaine Houston, Anchor of NewsChannel 13, served as moderator. It was a powerful symposium. Our goal was to raise awareness of this egregious human rights violation which occurs not only in large metropolitan cities but right here in our own capital district community. National Philoptochos includes human trafficking as one of its major philanthropic initiatives.
